**1 Welcome, apologies introductions new chairs and vice chairs and ground rules of meeting**

AE welcomed everyone to the meeting. The meeting was slightly delayed due to technical difficulties and attendees joining from another meeting.

*Apologies were received from Avon Fire and Rescue Service*

**2 Agree minutes of the last meeting**

The minutes of the meeting of 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2020 were agreed as a true record.

**3 Public Health update**

US shared his dashboard of the current statistics and latest information regarding COVID – 19 and mentioned the following:

- Decreased cases in the area, by age and by weeks
- Overall week by week decrease in cases
- Patients in hospitals have decreased
- Vaccinations have increased to over 116,000
- A graph which indicates a good decline in cases

- Our average is slightly higher than the South West average.
- Achieved 80-90% success roll out with the vaccine
- Paid care workers are now eligible.

**Q** How come people go to Gloucestershire for the vaccine? How is that covered in the statistics?

**A** Bristol and North Somerset all work together as a joint commissioning group so would be included within those figures.

**Q** What is the percentage of vaccine takers?

**A** I don't have a percentage breakdown, but I am happy to find this out. There have been around 76,000 people who have had the vaccine.

**Q** Do you have any news on the Bristol variant?

**A** Overall a great response from the areas affected. Testing went around the BS16 and BS36 area – around 1%, which is around 300 people, tested positive for COVID -19 that didn't realise they had it. There will be data reported within the next couple of weeks.

#### **4 SGC Climate Change Action Plan**

LR gave a presentation on the 'South Gloucestershire Climate Emergency Declaration' (see appendix 2):

- On 17<sup>th</sup> July 2019 the Council declared a Climate Emergency
- Council to provide yearly action plans and report back each December for the following year
- Become carbon neutral by 2030
- Plant trees by 2030 to double canopy cover
- Explained what a 'climate emergency' is and the impacts within the UK as well as the local impacts
- South Gloucestershire break down of emissions – transport, non-domestic and domestic
- Ways we are preparing for the local impacts
- Shares areas and map of the West of England Nature Recovery Group
- Currently living in a time described as '6<sup>th</sup> Mass Extinction'
- Working with local strategic partners with upcoming projects
- Giving examples on how we can reduce carbon emissions such as:
  - Journeys under 5 miles by public transport, walking, cycling
  - Reducing flights
  - Eating less meat and dairy
  - Ensuring pensions and investments are climate friendly
  - Changing the way we heat our homes – switching to heat pumps

**Q** Charfield is has had mass development, and still has future development to come in the local plan. All of this is car reliant because of poor public transport. The mitigation strategies for habitat renewal that are put in place don't really work, you have already responded to one of the applications to say it won't comply with the

Council's climate emergency. How much influence are you going to have over the Council's planners that this is more important than houses and it's not just words?

A I think the climate emergency is embedded really firmly in the council plan and we have our existing policies. We are limited by some of the national planning policies and our duties to abide by those. It is a high priority for the Council, and as you say we have made that response already in that one case where the proposals were not in line with the climate emergency declaration; but there are certain limitations to us in terms of the natural picture. It could be something we have more of a discussion about offline if that is useful.

Q Cllr Katie Cooper for the climate change response and we have come to the CEF meetings to give a response and to assess how people are thinking about the climate change and buying into the need to act. It would be nice to get an idea from the group, if they do believe there is a human impact on climate change and if so, what barriers they are looking at changing things?

A From resident-

Yes , I think it is a manmade issue and do think it's an emergency that we are facing. We are trying to work with the parish council on sustainable energy in these challenging times. It is difficult to make that contact. I think communication networks between the parish councils are difficult when we can't have a drop-in session due to covid 19 regulations.

I think that it might be helpful to have some guidance and advice on what is the right tree and in the right place.

A (from chat) Yes, I do believe in it - barriers include feeling like nothing we do as individuals will make a difference

## **6 Update from Avon and Somerset Police**

LB and KJ from Charfield police reported the following

- Reports of youths smoking cannabis – We are aware of the names. We are also increasing the patrols around the area in marked and unmarked cars to keep an eye out
- Incidents of minor damage in Charfield area – we have spoken to those involved and it seems to have stopped now
- Covid breaches – issued a few warnings and fines but overall everyone is well behaved
- Fly tipping in the lanes between Cromhall and Tytherington – reported to SGC and everything has been removed. Unable to identify who it was but will regularly patrol these areas
- General increase in hare coursing and poaching across the wider rural beats. Working with rural crime scene, and have managed to get hold of some signs to be distributed to land and farm owners. Reports have dropped
- Increase in scam calls and emails over the past 3-4 weeks. If you do receive them, please do not click the link as it asks you to put in your details. Current scams we are aware of include –

- Vaccine rollout – asking you to be on a trial period and to input your address and bank details in to get the vaccine
- Career fraud – convincing phone calls from people claiming to be the Police. They counterfeit with your bank and the call sounds legit
- Suspected computer virus – gives out a link and if you input your details then they have access to the whole of your computer and use your personal data
- People ringing about TV Licence or National Insurance numbers leading to identify theft
- Ringing about not paying tax and they will collect money or the individual from their house as you have not paid your tax
- Collated a 'Big Book of Scams' which can be collected from the station or contacted via email for a copy about all of the relevant scams and how to spot them.

KH reported the following from Chipping Sodbury police:

- Been busy with Covid breaches across all areas in South Gloucestershire but have been more relaxed recently
- ASB in Chipping Sodbury schools and the use of football pitches. They need to update and improve their CCTV as there have been Covid breach warnings and some youths have been banned from the area
- ASB as whole has reduced over the previous months. Nothing new to report. Going to be focussing on the long-term issues that have been caused around the area
- Public houses – pubs are shut. Still are getting reports from members of the public that breaches have taken place. Worked with licensing to action that and attending those pubs and see if breaches are taking place eg drinking at the back of the pub/gardens.
- When Covid reduces, we are working with licensing and will do more licensing checks
- Several reports of shed/garage break-ins which occur in the early evenings. Not much has been stolen, it is more the damage done. It is good to have security or CCTV around and alarms in the shed
- Poaching increased around the Badminton area in December. We have spoken to the farmers about this. It can be down to the weather conditions and we will pull our joint efforts across the BEAT teams to help out.

Q Where will the brochures be distributed?

A Cromhall main shop and other shops will have them available and across Charfield. We don't want to give too many out as we want the 'target audience' to receive them first.

Q You could scan the book to print off or put it on the website to access?

A That is a great idea, we could see about putting it on the website for the public to access.

Q Are you worried about the drug dealing at all?

A If you are referring to the play park incident, the moped was ceased the bike was abandoned. We are getting more information about this and the response officers are aware too.

## South Gloucestershire Climate Emergency Declaration



On the 17th July 2019 South Gloucestershire Council declared a Climate Emergency.

**Aims**

- Area wide to be carbon neutral by 2030
- Maximise local renewable energy generation
- Prepare for the local impacts of changing climate
- Increase nature. Better protect it and better connect it
- Plant trees by 2030 to double tree canopy cover.

**Pathway to be carbon neutral by 2030 we urgently need to:**

- Reduce mileage and encourage public transport, walking and cycling
- Change the way we power our vehicles
- Increase home insulation and heat homes differently and more efficiently
- Reduce business energy consumption
- Create more renewable energy
- Inform and include residents



The Climate Emergency declaration was a cross party decision

## What is the Climate Emergency?


Scientists are agreed that the earth is getting hotter and we need to do something about it quickly

Average global temperatures have now increased by 1°C above preindustrial levels. This is caused by humans burning fossil fuels for industry, transport and domestic

The speed and scale of the temperature rise matters because it is causing, big changes in global weather, sea level rise, rainfall patterns, plant and animal life, food production, water availability and human health.

The amount of global heating which takes place now and in the future depends on the total quantity of greenhouse gas pollution.

There are a number of greenhouse gases that trap heat in the atmosphere. Of these gases, carbon dioxide is the largest by amount and is the gas we have most control over.



This image shows increases in global temperature over the time period 1850-2017.

Each coloured line is an average year.

Blue= colder than average  
Red= hotter than average

## Climate breakdown impacts in the UK

1. Flooding and coastal change
2. Risks to health from high temperatures
3. Water shortages
4. Risks to nature
5. Risks to food production (International and local)
6. Increase in pests and diseases



## Nature and the planet are in crisis.

“The truth is: the natural world is changing. And we are totally dependent on that world. It provides our food, water and air. It is the most precious thing we have and we need to defend it.” Sir David Attenborough

We need to protect and restore nature and nature helps us tackle the Climate Emergency.  
For example:

- Storing carbon dioxide in vegetation, soil and healthy oceans
- Providing flood protection, regulating and cleaning water
- Providing cooling and shading
- Providing food and medicine sources
- Naturally rebuilding soil health

## Nature and the planet are in crisis.

We are living through a time described as the 6th Mass Extinction, with nature disappearing faster than ever before.

- Global– 60% decline in wild animals
- UK– 95% declines in wildlife favourites like hedgehogs
- South Gloucestershire 96% decline in swifts and starlings

\$44 trillion – over half the world’s income (GDP) is dependent on nature and the services nature provides.



## South Gloucestershire Council

- Direct emissions from
  - council buildings,
  - schools
  - street lighting,
  - vehicles
  - business mileage
 = 1.2% of South Gloucestershire's total emissions
- Council goods and services 0.5%
- Influence through planning, transport and waste 46%

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
## Increase nature. Better protect it, better connect it

## Question:

When will we start to experience some of the impacts of climate change?

- A: 2100
- B: 2050
- C: 2020

The effects of climate change are here and now in the UK and abroad and these effects will increase over time. There are regular news stories of extreme weather and mass migration caused by crop failure and water scarcity made worse by climate change. Even here in the UK we have had record winter flooding (2019) and record dry spring (May 2020).

**This does not mean that it is too late to take action. In fact every extra degree of warming matters and so all efforts are worthwhile.**

## Question:

- **What changes can you make in your own lifestyle and through the work you do?**

Examples: Switch to a renewable energy provider,

Walk more, Eat less meat, Waste less food, Influence my employers, bank, pension providers.

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## Answers to questions:

- Question1 answer C: 2020
- Question2 answer C: 18%
- Question6 answer: B: Approx. 5,500 hectares is roughly equivalent to 5,500 football pitches. That's a lot of trees! And much more land than South Gloucestershire council owns. Therefore we need to work with residents, businesses and partners to achieve this aim.
